Zhang Linpeng

Zhang is a 32-year-old Chinese footballer, who currently plays for Guangzhou in the Chinese Super League. Zhang is known by the nickname 'Zhangmos' for his similarity in looks and playing style as Sergio Ramos.

Oriini Kaipara

Oriini Kaipara is a 38-year-old New Zealand broadcaster, journalist and translator and interpreter of te reo Māori.

In 2021, Oriini made history by becoming the first person to present a prime time news programme with a traditional Māori chin tattoo (known as a moko kauae). She said the opportunity made a lifelong dream come true and hoped she was the first of many Māori women to present the news with their traditional tattoos on show. "I'm very much aware that I'm the first [with moko kauae] to anchor a six o'clock primetime news bulletin," she told local media.

Māori tattooing or Tā moko is used to represent the wearer's family heritage and social status. It is a rite of passage for Māori women, marking the transition between girl and adulthood, and symbolises the personal process.
